A Few JOYCE Words

As this year ends all of us will have differing memories of what was most important to us. For me, it will begin with the death of my oldest child, my daughter, Sylvia, on August 8th. 2018 was a bad year for my family - too much illness, too many hospital stays, requiring too many visits, too harsh an ending for some.

In the political realm, it will be two things: 1) the deterioration of my confidence that a president is meant to lead the country, but not to destroy our faith in the office as Trump has done. It seems that every time I feel things cannot be worse, they become worse. In the 58 years since I first cast my vote for John F. Kennedy, I had always believed that no matter who was elected to the office that person understood the Constitution and his role in the provisions of that document. Not anymore. I am convinced that not only does Trump not know anything in that document, but he is not interested in understanding the presidential role provided within it. Rather than serving as our leader in the Executive Branch, he prefers the role of "Campaigner in Chief." I would be dishonest if I did not say that, in addition, to my joy that Democrats retook control of the U.S. House of Representatives, the repudiation of Trump's philosophy in the House was absolute. Unfortunately, things did not end so well for a couple of our Democratic senators.

2) The election of 2018 did produce someone who has reminded us of the power of government to aspire to do great things, to provide the promise of a different approach to public office. The promise of a man like Beto O'Rourke is needed in an executive office such as governor or president far more than a legislative one. His vision, concern for people and focus was one of our biggest losses. I wonder how things would have turned out if he had run against Governor Greg Abbott instead of Ted Cruz. Well, he is young and will have another opportunity to run.

In the meantime, it seems only Robert Mueller can save our country from more problems caused by this president. He and the Democratic majority in the House (led by Speaker Nancy Pelosi) will provide the assurance that someone will be watching his actions as well as serving as a check on the issues Trump puts forward.

As everyone should know by now, our 41st president, George H. W. Bush passed away this weekend and will have been buried by the time we meet. He was a man who knew the value of compromise and how to get things done. I remember well his statement when Iraq moved into Kuwait - "This shall not stand." I quoted it so often in the years that followed when something happened at home that I disagreed with.
