As many of you know on May 4th our entire City Council, the Mayor and all 10 districts of the Council will be up for voters to either keep the members they have or elect a new one.

We have had several programs recently which allowed us to see the majority of those running in Districts 6, 7, and 8, as well as three of the mayoral candidates. Getting to hear their answers to our questions gives us an opportunity to make a better determination of how the new candidates stand on issues.

It is critical that each of us who live in the city express our views on the candidates through our votes. We will all have this opportunity, provided we are currently registered, of course. Each of us may vote early by mail if we are 65 or older, or at the early voting polls if still We older adults can still go to the polls. Early voting extends from April 22-April 30, and you will be able to vote at a number of early voting places. Election Day will be May 4th at your

regular voting precinct.

Gene and Mere Tour the West Side

Recently, Mere Rodriguez, our Chair, took me on a tour of her old nieighborhood on the West side. We met on S. Zarzamora and drove on some roads which are considered streets but look more like alleys. We saw many very small houses and many homes in decaying conditions. Here and there people were renovating and fixing up houses, which was good to see. But the overall housing stock is very old and in need of improvements. It is a big difference from suburban San Antonio.

How can we help improve the conditions in the older parts of the City? The next mayoral election will make a big difference. The Mayor's Task Force on Housing Policy has a plan to improve the housing in San Antonio. The existing policies are not benefiting homeowners. These policies benefit developers.
